Dear Parents and Guardians,

At Fremont City Schools, the safety of our students is always our top priority, and that includes their transportation to and from school. Riding the school bus is one of the safest ways for students to travel, but it requires the cooperation of everyone—students, parents, and drivers—to maintain a secure and smooth experience. Here are some important reminders to reinforce with your children:

<ul> <li>Arrive Early – Students should be at the bus stop at least five</li> </ul>
minutes before the scheduled arrival time to prevent rushing or
unsafe behavior.
□ Stay Back – Always stand at least five big steps away from the
curb while waiting for the bus.
□ Board Safely – Wait until the bus comes to a complete stop,
the doors open, and the driver signals before stepping onto the
bus.
☐ <b>Sit Properly</b> – Students should remain seated, face forward,
and keep their belongings out of the aisle.
□ Use Inside Voices – Loud noises can distract the bus driver.
Keeping voices low helps ensure a safe ride.
☐ Follow the Driver's Instructions — The bus driver is in charge
and is there to keep everyone safe. Listening carefully and
following directions is essential.
<ul> <li>Be Cautious When Exiting – After getting off the bus, students</li> </ul>
should walk at least 10 feet in front of it before crossing the street
and always wait for the driver's signal.

Parents, please remind your children of these rules and model safe behaviors when driving near school buses. Always stop when the bus's red lights are flashing—it's the law and protects our students. Thank you for partnering with us to keep every child safe on their way to and from school. If you have any questions or concerns regarding transportation safety, please contact our school office.

# (Assisting Children to Excel)

The ACE Mentoring Program has begun its second semester with a focus on future success. This program pairs students from Fremont Middle School (FMS) and Ross with local community mentors who provide both emotional and academic support. The students and mentors meet weekly or bi-weekly during an encore class, where sessions focus on study skills, college preparation, and career readiness.

The program matches students with mentors based on personal interests and career aspirations, and mentors come from various professional backgrounds, offering students a unique opportunity to receive guidance in choosing potential career paths. Many students have seen improvements in their grades, attendance, and overall academic performance, with some earning honor roll status.

Currently, 50 students from FMS are participating in the ACE Mentoring Program for the 2024-2025 school year. Students are always welcome to join, though parent permission is required.

# **CAPITAL**



Team Capital has been busy getting back into the schedule and routine, especially with so many weather events happening. Students in ELA are beginning to dig into their non-fiction units after completing their iReady diagnostics. In Math, students are exploring algebraic concepts such as combining like terms and adding & subtracting linear expressions. Mr. Wolf's history class is also exploring the ancient history of Greece including their governmental systems, important persons, the geography and more. Lastly, in science, students are gaining knowledge regarding food webs and the food chain while developing an understanding of how things work together. Aside from the focus on academics Team Capital has been working to motivate its students using what we refer to as "Capital Punch Cards." Students who perform as expected, go out of their way to do positive things, or appropriately engage in the day-to-day happenings during class receive a punch on their punch card. Once their ticket has been fully punched they are able to play our Capital "Plinko." Students drop a puck down the board and whatever they land on at the bottom is their prize. This has been a great way to engage more students positively while promoting the attention given to students who are doing what they need to be doing as a student and individual on a daily basis. **Math** - In 7th grade math we finished our unit on percentages, and we are now working on algebraic expressions. The students are learning to find the answer to a one step equation by isolating the variable. They will have time in class to start their assignment, but it will have to be finished by the following day. Please check google classroom daily for assignments.

In 7th grade honors we finished our unit on finding slope and the y-intercept, and are now learning about interpreting functions. This concept is very similar to the slope and y-intercept. We complete a lot of examples together, some with a partner, and some individually. I give time in class to work on assignments, but they must complete what they don't finish as homework. Please check google classroom daily for assignments.

**Science** - In 7th grade science, students are learning how Earth rotates on its axis to give us day and night. Students are also learning that Earth's revolution around the sun takes 1 year. Students are connecting that information to understand the reasons Earth has seasons.

**Social Studies** - Students will continue to work on their Trans-Saharan travel guide. They will also look at the slave trade, barter systerm, and the spread of Islam throughout Africa

**ELA** - OST prep is underway in all classes with our current focus being writing formal essays. Students will use a step-by-step approach in determining the type of essay to write, brainstorming using the best method for the topic, and constructing the actual essay.

**Minor** - Students are working on the RACE writing strategy in preparation for the OST.

In **Social Studies**, we have moved on from Mesopotamia and have started to study Ancient Egypt! This is such a fun unit to study, as we learn about the Egyptian Gods/Goddesses, the pyramids, the mummification process, and writing in hieroglyphics. We have a number of hands-on projects that we will be completing during this time.

In **Science** we are wrapping up our matter unit. Students learned about the periodic table, density, and the states of matter. Next up we will be talking about rocks and minerals! Students will be able to have some interesting hands-on experiences throughout the unit. Students will also have the opportunity to participate in the March Mammal Madness tournament. We have entered the world of Algebra in **Math**! The students are learning about how to solve equations, write expressions, and are learning about solving a formula. The **ELA** classes are beginning their study of nonfiction. Students will begin working in their unit three workbooks and will be completing a five paragraph essay this quarter. The students are off to a great start with Chapters for Chips and many are well on their way to reaching their goal and getting their chips. We also had 50 students improve their I-ready scores and receive a treat for all their hard work in that regard.
