A CURRICULUM DESIGNED TO FOSTER SELF-REGULATION AND EMOTIONAL CONTROL

Each week the students have been participating in two lessons relating to the Zones of Regulation. Below are the topics thus far that have been covered with their teachers.

Lessons 1 and 2- "Introduction of the 4 Zones", "Identifying emotions and state of alertness for each zone."

Lessons 3 and 4- "Identifying emotions viewing characters in video clips", "Identifying emotions in given scenarios."

Lesson 5 and 6- "Understanding Different Perspectives", "How does my behavior affect others?"

Lesson 7 and 9- "Identifying more emotions in th zones." "Identifying Triggers"

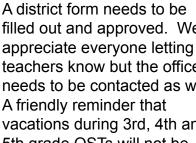
Final Forms

Exposure to COVID

- -Students are no longer required to quarantine due to exposure unless symptomatic.
- -It is recommended if exposed and symptom free a student should mask in school for 5 days. Any questions, please contact the school nurse at 419-332-0091. Thank You!

Transportation Home

If a student's transportation home is changing for the day, please contact the school office at 419-332-0091. We cannot go by a child's directive. Thank you!

Attendance Policy

- -Students are allotted 5 days of excused absences without a doctor's note in one school
- -After 5 days of excused absences a doctor's note is needed. Otherwise absences will be considered "unexcused".
- -If a student tests positive for COVID proof is needed. For example: a note sent from a doctor OR a picture of the COVID test to include student's name and date.
- -If proof of COVID is presented to the office, the absences due to COVID will not count toward a student's 5 days.

Habitual Truancy

- -30 or more consecutive hours without a legitimate excuse
- -42 or more hours in one school month without a legitimate excuse
- -72 or more hours in one school year without a legitimate excuse

The earliest students may arrive at school is 8:30 a.m. Thank you for your support!

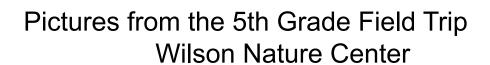

So, what is the most important academic skill your child needs to learn in school that will build on every other subject? If you guessed READ, you are right! You can help your child to be successful now and in his/her future by supporting positive reading habits. You can start when your child is an infant by looking at books and talking to your child. For preschoolers, point out words on signs and describe what you are doing for them as you do it. For elementary children, spend 20 minutes a day reading or having your child read to you. Older students should read on their own daily, but often still enjoy listening to adults read.

How to Encourage Reading

- Visit a public library for books and magazines with your child's interest.
- Use a tablet to download books from the library or purchase some from an online retailer.
- Read a comic book or newspaper.
- Read in front of your child.
- Ask questions about what your child is reading.



Future Chat questions: What kinds of books do you like to read? What is the career name for someone who writes books? What is the career name for someone who draws pictures in a book?

Responsibility is the word of the month for October. Each individual is responsible for his/her choices. It is important to teach kids to be responsible at a young age so they become accountable for their actions. No one is perfect, but developing habits of responsibility will create self-sufficient adults and community citizens.

We will be celebrating Red Ribbon Week this month. Students will have the opportunity to do make a responsible choice and pledge to a healthy, drug free life. Please talk about to your child about the importance of making responsible choices to keep our minds and bodies healthy.

Teach Responsibility at Home:

- Give age appropriate chores i.e. setting the table, helping with dinner, making his/her bed, taking out the trash.
- Make your child responsible for packing and unpacking their backpack each night. You can supervise.
- Make your child responsible for completing his/her homework. You can help if needed, but without doing it for him/her.
- Set the expectation that your child cleans up him/herself.
- Set behavior expectations and hold your child accountable for his/her actions. Consequences or rewards should be followed through. It might not seem like it, but they want and need to be held accountable.
